
So, I have been watching the girls and picking them up from school





Brake Fluid Tester Lights Up the Results

Automotive brake fluid does a great job of activating the brake cylinders that, in-turn, pushes the brake shoes against the drum, so we can stop our Studebaker when we need to.

However, brake fluid has a downside you need to be aware of, namely, it absorbs moisture from the environment.

The technical term for this is Hygroscopic.

Hygroscopic is the phenomenon of attracting and holding water molecules via adsorption from the surrounding environment.

When this occurs, the moisture content can change the chemistry of the brake fluid, which can negatively affect how well your brakes work. Additionally, the extra moisture will cause the metal in your braking system to begin to corrode and rust.

This hit home recently as I've been helping a young fellow resurrect his 1957 Studebaker Transtar pickup.

While jockeying the truck around the yard, one of the rear brakes locked up solid. No amount of rocking it with the engine would free it. This could have been disastrous if we'd been out and about town in it. ?!



I found the brake master cylinder was full of brake fluid, but it was a dirty rusty brown color, certainly not what I expected to see.

Tearing into the brakes I found the wheel cylinder components were rusty and inhibiting the free movement of the components which is why the wheel had locked-up.

Seeing this, I became concerned about the brakes in our other Studebakers. What I needed was a quick and easy way to check the moisture content of brake fluid.

The answer was found in a small device that looks like an ink pen called a Brake Fluid Tester available at auto parts stores and online parts outlets as well, often for less than \$20.

Powered by a small battery, the tester has green, yellow and red LEDs, and two metal contacts at one end.

Operation is simple: Install the battery, turn on the tester, dip the metal contacts into the fluid bowl of your brake master cylinder.


The tester measures the moisture content and lights up the appropriate LED.

Before testing the Transtar, I tested an old bottle of DOT3 that's been on the shelf for several years. It lit

up the yellow LED.

I also tested a new bottle of DOT3 and it lit up the green LED. When I tested the Transtar, the tester lit up the red LED indicating too much moisture in the brake fluid – thus confirming why I was seeing the rust in the brake system.

We all spend a lot of time making our Studebakers look good. Why not spend a minute checking your brake fluid to ensure you and your family's safety

Tech Tips

Get the Dents Out with Dry Ice

Your sports minded friends didn't catch the football while playing in the front yard. Oops, you now have a small dent in your older car!

You may be able to take it out yourself using dry ice.

I grew up in Iowa, so I had my fair share of dents caused by hail on a few of my vehicles. I used the dry ice method with

success.

My late 1970s Chevy encountered hail damage that peppered the top, hood, and deck lid with hundreds of ball peen hammer sized dents. My insurance company salvaged it because it was too expensive to repair in relation to the price of the car.

I bought the salvage, took out

all the dents with dry ice, took it back to my insurance company, and they re-insured me as if the damage never happened. (FYI, this was way before companies like Carfax kept track of damage reports on vehicles.)

A dent appears in a body panel because the metal is expanded from the force of the object that hit it. Dry ice works because the extreme cold reacts with the metal causing it to contract.

This tip works best on older cars (1980 and below) because they were made with a thicker, heavier metal, which was softer than the metal in newer cars. In the

1980s the trend was for manufacturers to reduce the weight of their vehicles, so they used thinner metal that was specially manufactured and not as pliable.

- Assess your dent. It needs to be small, with no creases, no paint cracks, and no paint chips.
- Work in a shaded area to avoid heat fluctuation.
- Clean the area to be treated so it's free of dirt, debris, wax, and grease.

 Put on protective gloves to prevent frostbite. Wear protective goggles. Keep dry ice in an insulated container.

• Place a chunk of dry ice, as close to the size of the dent as possible, in a rag or towel.

• Lightly rub the dent in a small circular motion for about 20-30 seconds.

• Visually evaluate your dent,

repeat if necessary.

- Continue visually evaluating and repeating as needed.
- If your dent has improved but is not completely gone, you can try heating the area lightly with a hair dryer (NOT a heat gun) and then repeating with the dry ice.
- If the dent is gone, great! If it isn't, you are only out a few dollars before you take it to a

repair shop. Many shops specialize in paintless dent removal.

• Wash and wax your car.

Things to be aware of:

- If you overdo the process, you could possibly warp the metal due to excessive expansion and contraction.
- Overdoing the process could possibly damage the paint, such as cracking, chipping, burning, or dulling of the finish.
- Dry ice method is not advised on large dents because the distance necessary to rub the dent in circles would cause inconsistent temperature changes across the dent, interfering with the expansion/contraction process.
- Metal has a "memory" of sorts. It wants to return to its original shape. Remember the old oil spout cans where you pressed the bottom with your thumbs to squirt out the oil, or those metal toy clickers that you pressed, and they sprung back? It's the same idea. When a dent gets a crease in it, it locks the dent in place, requiring a different procedure. Also keep in mind that if the dent you fixed was deep enough, there is a possibility it could pop back at a later date.
- Your insurance company may have specific rules for dent repair, based on your type of coverage and cause of the dent. Weigh your options.
