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### A New Twist on the Old Repossession Game

No one finances a new or used car and plans on having it repossessed someday for missing payments, but life happens, the economy fluctuates, and surprise financial hardships are a very real thing. If you fall behind on your car payments for long enough, you can rest assured that the creditor is going to try and take it back.

<u>The Drive</u> came across <u>a patent filed by Ford</u> that details "Systems and Methods to Repossess a Vehicle." The patent was originally submitted in August 2021, but wasn't published until recently. Every method described in this patent is designed to make the repossession process much easier on creditors and much harder on those who are struggling to make payments, by disabling several critical functions of the vehicle to make it more difficult or uncomfortable to drive in certain situations.

Imagine falling behind on your car payments and then one hot summer day you realize that the air conditioning stops working or that the car will simply not start at all. Those are the kinds of interference that Ford imagines could be triggered remotely via the systems detailed in this patent.




### **Team Studebaker Competes in Pure Stock**



### Notes from the Studebaker Nation — Robin Shepard

The year 1955 marks a watershed moment in American culture, and the beginning of the modern era. A decade after the end of WWII, American arts and technology threw off the features that typified the sullied 1940s.

It's no surprise that James Dean's stunning portrayal of a tortured teen in 1955's *Rebel Without a Cause* popularized a whole new genre of film, the hot rod/teenage/rock 'n' roll gang exploitation flick. While his character drove a '49 Merc, the movie proclaimed the dividing line between old and new.

Nothing would be the same again.

It was the inaugural year for Gunsmoke and Disneyland, the year Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat, launching the modern civil rights movement, and the year that Elvis blistered the stage on the Louisiana Hayride, single-handedly creating modern music.

The '50s are defined by a new cultural revolution, consumerism. In 1955 7.9 million cars were sold in the US. Seven out of 10 families owned an automobile. American was on the move.

And they were driving on a modern, high-speed system of interconnected freeways and highways in truly modern and strikingly original American automobiles.

Every new domestic car introduced in 1955 was unlike



anything we had seen previously. From the Bel Aire to the Thunderbird, art and design merged to create gleaming sculptures of metal and paint, fabric and chrome.

The automotive design revolution was best exemplified by the various divisions of Chrysler. What's more beautiful than the DeSoto Fireflight of that year? The tri-tone Dodge Royal Lancer and the immaculate beauty of the C 300 or Imperial are unparalleled.

(While this column focuses on American cars, it's worth noting that in France Citroen rolled out the goddess, the DS. Truly, this is the most amazing car of 1955.)

The two other major manufacturers weren't far behind Chrysler's Forward Look. In 1955 General Motors introduced a radically redesigned Bel Air and gave the Corvette a major upgrade with a V8 power plant.

Across the GM divisions, from Buick and Oldsmobile to the venerable Cadillac, American automobiles never looked better.

The '55 Fords were also given a facelift, though in less spectacular fashion than Chrysler and GM lines. The Fairlane Sunliner is a stunner, as is the Crown Victoria.

However, stepping outside the Big Three and taking a look, what do we see? Packard, Nash and Hudson all introduced redesigned models, including the Packard Caribbean, Nash Ambassador, and Hudson Hornet, all beautiful examples of mid-century design.

Studebaker wrapped its '55s in a heavily chromed front bumper and long stainless accents running the length of the car.

Unfortunately, the '56-'57 Studebakers would never match the timeless beauty of the '53-55 models. And Chrysler, which started the revolution, would enter the '60s with some of the most bizarre car designs in history. But that's a subject for another column.

Regrettably, 1995 also marked the end of the upstart Kaiser car company. The Manhattan from that year ranks as perhaps the most beautiful American sedan on the road.


A longer study might very well reveal the interlocking threads of philosophy, art, and science that created the inevitable outcomes of 1955.

It was a pivotal year for American car manufacturers, one in which custom and **He** tradition were abandoned for originality and innovation.

### Tech Tips

# Hard Starts Have Some Simple Solutions

You say that your car won't start?

Do you mean it won't start or it won't crank? If it won't crank, it sure won't start. It might crank but still not start. Before you start checking things, you need to decide what the problem is.

If you turn the key to start and don't hear the engine cranking, you have a cranking problem. If you turn the key to the start position and you hear the engine cranking but it won't start, you have a starting problem.

Let's tackle the cranking problem first. Turning on the headlights to see if they work is typically a waste

of time. It takes very little to make the headlights work. It takes lots of amps to crank the engine.

More electrical problems are caused by loose or dirty connections at the battery than by any other cause. Check to see if they are tight. If they seem tight, they probably still need to be removed and cleaned.

Remove the ground cable first. The ground cable used on 12 volt Studebakers is con- nected to the negative side of the battery. Next, remove the positive cable. Never disconnect the positive cable first unless you are working on a 6 volt, positive ground Studebaker.

Clean the posts with an inexpensive battery post cleaning tool. Clean the inside of the battery cable ends with the same tool. Coat the battery posts with Vaseline or grease and re-install the cables. Make sure that you install the positive cable first.

Still won't crank? Maybe the battery is dead. Loose or dirty connections at the battery or elsewhere may have kept the charging system from being able to charge the battery.

While you are checking the connection to the starter, check to see that the two bolts holding the starter to the engine are tight. Hopefully you can get it to crank now. Remove the caps from the top of the battery and look into it. There should be enough acid to cover the tops of the lead plates in each cell. If you can see the top plates in any of the cells, that cell is probably bad.

Add enough distilled water to each cell to ensure that the lead plates are covered. Don't use tap water. There are contaminants in tap water which will shorten the battery's life. A gallon of distilled watecosts about a dollar at the grocery store.

Next, hook up the battery charger, connecting the positive lead first and then the negative lead. If the charger shows a high charging rate, the battery is

probably low. Hopefully, the engine will crank after the battery has been recharged.

The charger will show a low charge or no charge after it has successfully recharged the battery. If the charger fails to initially show a charge or if it continues to show a high charge, the battery is probably no good.

An inexpensive hydrometer battery tester can be picked up at an auto parts store. These testers measure the specific gravity of the acid solution. They give you an idea of the battery's condition by how many balls float when the hydrometer is filled with acid.

If you can't get the battery to take a charge, take it to an auto parts store where you can get it tested for free. If you have eliminated the battery and its connections as a problem and still can't get the engine to crank, you need to do some more troubleshooting.

The positive battery cable runs to one side of the starter solenoid. Check to see that the connection at the solenoid is tight. Check to see if the connection on the other side of the solenoid is tight. The cable on the other side of the solenoid goes to the starter.


