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Bill Seeks to Expand Legacy License Plate Program

According to the Sema Action Network, California Assemblyman Tim Grayson, a State Automotive Enthusiast Leadership Caucus member, has introduced SAN-supported legislation (AB 378) to expand the state's successful Legacy License Plate Program, which is available for all model years of motor vehicles.

Under the bill, the DMV would create and issue an additional series of new specialized license plates resembling designs from the state's past: 1950s (black lettering on yellow background) and 1970s (yellow lettering on blue background).

Currently, only the style of the 1960s (yellow lettering on black background) is available for a \$50 fee.

Similar to the 2013 law that launched this program, AB 378—if enacted into law—would require at least 7,500 applications for any one particular plate design to be received by the DMV on or before January 1, 2025, in order to go into production.

Having passed the Assembly Committee on Transportation, the bill now awaits consideration in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations. Use the following website <u>link</u> for an overview and lawmaker contact.

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



Notes from the Studebaker Nation — Robin Shepard

What has one wheel, is powered by atomic energy, can hover in the air, and even take flight into outer space? And it seats a family of four?

If you said George Jetson's car, you wouldn't be far off.

In 1957, Studebaker asked interior design director Ed Hermann to visualize the car of the future. What his team created out of glass reinforced plastics was called the Astral, a concept car that, while cartoonish, is imaginative and still looks well into the future.

Now housed at the Studebaker National Museum, the only Astral produced was unveiled to the public in 1958 Exhibition at the Art Center of South Bend. It later appeared at the March 1958 Geneva Motor Show before disappearing for the next 30 years.

The Astral's power plant was proposed to be a nuclear reactor, though there was speculation that "ionic" (whatever that is) power was the solution. An engine was never prototyped, of course.



The Studebaker Astral, above, could've shared the success of inventor Charles Taylor's working model of a one-wheel vehicle (below).



At the center of the design is the one gyroscopically stabilized wheel that kept passengers on the road. Whether Studebaker engineers actually manufactured the wheel is unknown to this

author. However, the concept is a working one and already seen in application.

In 1964, American engineer and inventor Charles F. Taylor patented a one-wheel vehicle. He built working prototypes and there is home movie footage of him driving one of the vehicles.

There are some advantages to a one-wheel gyroscopic vehicle, in that it can remain stable and advance over difficult terrain that would impair four-wheel cars and trucks.

The concept is not so farfetched. In fact, one-wheel hoverboards are already carrying people over city streets.

Studebaker's designers and engineers were dreaming big in the late 50s. Imagine what could've been.

The Sceptre would've been a great concept to production car.


But the Avanti would be produced in a few years, and that was definitely a car of the future.



Tech Tips

This Regulator Allows You to Keep 6v Gauges

Converting your car to 12 volts but still want to use your original 6-volt gauges?

Daniel Carpenter Mustang Restoration Parts sells an aftermarket Ford instrument panel gauge voltage regulator that is used from 1956 up through the 1980s. It's the one I use because it's electronic, it's economical, and it's easy to find.

(Whenever you work with electricity ALWAYS unhook your battery for safety, negative cable first, then positive cable.)

Look on your ignition lock cylinder (ignition switch) for the accessory terminal (usually marked with A or ACC, the other terminals say BAT, IGN, and ST). It will probably have the most wires on it.

Find the wire that runs from the accessory terminal to the back of the gauges on the gauge cluster. In most Studebakers these will usually be the gas and temperature gauges.

You will be splicing the wire between the accessory terminal and the first gauge, so locate a spot

under the dash to mount the regulator that will allow the splicing to reach but is out of sight.

If there isn't a convenient hole where you want to place it, safely drill a hole (being careful not to nick wire bundles, radios, glove boxes, etc. that might be unique to your vehicle) and mount the regulator using a star washer and screw.

This will ground it. Then attach the ignition switch side of the splice to the quarter inch male disconnect end, (the Daniel Carpenter voltage regulator has IGN printed alongside the male disconnect end) and the gauges side of the splice to the quarter inch female disconnect end, using the appropriate techniques for attaching the corresponding disconnects to your spliced wires. These will be the blue ones for 14-16 gauge.

It is wise to test your connection with a voltmeter before starting your car.

The amp gauge in your vehicle stands alone, it is not connected to the other gauges. It does not need a reducer, as it doesn't use voltage.

If you have a vehicle that was a 6 volt positive ground, you will need to reverse the 2 big wires on your amp gauge to make it read correctly.

To check to see if it's wired correctly, with the engine off, turn on your headlights. The amp gauge should show a negative charge (or discharge). If not, you still need to reverse the 2 big wires. Remember to unhook the battery for safety when reversing the wires.

or those who don't want to put another car company's part into your car, no worries. You can also use a Zener diode set up. If you are interested in making a Zener diode set up, let me know. However, this voltage regulator is a lot cleaner, simpler, and very dependable.


